General Meeting Sept 7

Speaker: Dr Mark Hafen, USF Sea-level Rise in Florida

Dr. Hafen is a Senior Instructor in the Dept. of Geography, Environment and Planning at USF. His PhD is in Marine Science. He has taught courses in Wetland Environments, Env. & Planning Issues in Coastal Cities, Environmental Regulation, and Environmental Policy & the Built Environment.

He spoke to the meeting of conservation chairs of Audubon Societies for our Region last year. It was a very impressive presentation about the evidence and the risks. Sorry we don't have more information at this point, but I'll get it up on the website as soon as I can!

Sept 17—Saddle Creek and Circle B Bar Reserve.

Limited to 10 people. Location: 3899 Morgan Combee Rd, Lakeland. Meet at the end of the dirt road leading to the "Nature Trails" at 8:00 AM. Saddle Creek Park, on the north side of Lakeland, is wellknown in local birding circles as a good spot for migrating land birds in the fall. It is one of the better inland locations in Central Florida for migrating warblers. Join us as we see for ourselves what is moving through that day. We will be birding along the edge of hardwood swamps and ponds, and a portion of the trail goes through a "tunnel" of Brazilian pepper. It is likely to be hot and humid at that time of year, and there WILL be mosquitoes! Insect repellant is almost mandatory for this outing. Also be sure to bring water and snacks to get you through the morning, and to dress appropriately for the conditions. If there has been recent rainfall, be prepared for muddy sections in the trail.

When we are finished at Saddle Creek, anyone who wants can follow us to Circle-B-Bar Reserve for a picnic lunch. (Bring your own food/drinks.) Afterlunch birding will be available there, as well. COMMITTEE UPDATES

BIRD PROTECTION COMMITTEE

The Bird Protection Committee is working to install carcass chutes at fishing piers, boat ramps and docks in the region, to prevent bony fish carcasses from being fed to Brown Pelicans and other seabirds. The chutes deposit the carcasses below the surface of the water, out of reach of the birds. Pelicans often end up with carcasses stuck in their throats and die slow painful deaths. The chutes also prevent birds from learning to come to people for food, which puts them in danger of becoming entangled in fish-



ing line. According to Florida
Fish and Wildlife, fishing line is
the leading cause of death for
Brown Pelicans. As you can
see, we have much work to do
in Hillsborough County. This is

the boat ramp at Gandy. Birds waiting to be fed! Not even trash cans! Wood Storks are state and federally listed as threatened! Your donations to this project are welcomed. Please note Hooked Bird fund on

CONSERVATION COMMITTEE

BIRD SURVEYS— Plans are proceeding for doing bird surveys on both the Shultz Preserve and Rock Ponds areas in SW Hillsborough County. These are great preserve areas that have been restored from previous farm use. SWFWMD is interested in monitoring the changes in bird use across the areas as the restoration progresses. We're expecting to do 4 surveys a year in each location. If you're interested

NEXT YEAR'S TRIPS AND PROGRAMS

PUERTO RICO MARCH 23-29, 2018!

Only 7 spaces left! Circle the island, find all 17 endemics and more, with good food, a great guide (Tom Johnson, of WINGS) and easy walking! Cost for the 7 days, including the first dinner in San Juan and until delivery to the airport on Day 7, is \$2,475 per person double occupancy. Single supplement is \$450. Airfare, alcohol and personal items are not included.

Find the complete itinerary and registration details on the website. Here's a quick summary:



Day 1 starts in San Juan with a meeting and dinner.

Day 2 leaves early from San Juan, we breakfast Rio Abajo Forest, then walk to the endangered PR Parrot.

Days 2, 3 and 4 we stay at La

Parguera and drive out in

different directions to the mountains, the coast and wetlands, checking all the habitats for their birds, including a night walk for PR nightjars.

Day 5 we drive to El Yunque, stopping at various birdy spots along the way. We spend the next 2 nights there, with a trip to the coast and Humacao Nature Reserve, walks in the cloud forest, and a search for Antillean Crested Hummingbirds.

Day 7 we breakfast in El Yunque, then return to San Juan for the flight home.
